MEET OUR NEW DIVISION CHAIR



TRACY DENNISON

Professor of Social Science History; Ronald and Maxine Linde Leadership Chair of the Division of the Humanities and Social Sciences

On October 1, Dennison takes the baton from Jean-Laurent Rosenthal as the new Ronald and Maxine Linde Leadership Chair of the Division of the Humanities and Social Sciences. Dennison holds a PhD in history from the University of Cambridge and a BA in Russian language and literature (with a minor in political science) from Bucknell University. Her research focuses on the political economy of pre-modern central and eastern Europe, especially the role of institutions in long-run economic growth and development. She has published extensively on serfdom, property rights, state capacity and state formation, and the economic divergence between western and eastern

Europe. Her dissertation won the Economic History Association's Alexander Gerschenkron Prize in 2004. Dennison's first book, *The Institutional Framework of Russian Serfdom*, was awarded the Economic History Society's prize for Best First Monograph, as well as prizes from the Agricultural History Society and the Association for Slavonic, East European, and Eurasian Studies. From 2015–17 she held an Alexander von Humboldt Fellowship at the Ludwig Maximilian University in Munich, where she began work on a new book about serfdom and state formation in Prussia and Russia.

PROFESSORIAL FACULTY



PETER CARADONNA
Assistant Professor of Economics

Caradonna's research is focused on better understanding the empirical content of various models of preference and decision making. He uses a combination of

microeconomic and statistical theory in his research to obtain predictions or tests of behavior that are robust under model misspecification, data limitations, or perturbations of a model's underlying assumptions. He holds a degree in economics and mathematics from Boston University (BA '11) and degrees in economics from both the University of Oxford (MPhil '13) and Georgetown University (PhD '22).



PAWEL JANAS
Assistant Professor of Economics

Janas is an economic historian with research interests in finance and urban economics. He studies the consequences of financial crises on governments and households, focusing

on local public goods, education, and long-run growth. In his research, he uncovers and digitizes large historical data sets and uses quantitative methods to answer important empirical questions. His dissertation explored the impact of the Great Depression on U.S. cities and school districts. Janas holds degrees in economics (BA '16) and applied mathematics (BS '16, MS '16) from the University of Colorado Boulder, as well as in finance from Northwestern University (MS '22, PhD '22).

LECTURERS AND VISITORS



CAITLIN BERRIGAN
Artist-in-Residence

Berrigan will be the Caltech-Huntington Program in Visual Culture artist-in-residence for the winter term. With a master's in visual art from MIT, she works across video, sculpture, performance, and text to engage with the intimate and embodied dimensions of power, politics, and capitalism. Her solo show at Art in General in New York in 2019 was titled *Imaginary Explosions*, and she published an artist's book of the same name in 2018 (Broken Dimanche Press). During her residency at Caltech, she will teach a course on world-building, which is an imaginative exercise practiced in the arts and sciences to envision alternative universes.



DMITRI LEVITINVisiting Fellow in the Research Institute for the History of Science and Technology (RIHST)

Levitin studies the intellectual, cultural, and religious history of early modern Europe and its relationship with the wider world. He completed a PhD in history and an MPhil in political thought and intellectual history, both at the University of Cambridge. Levitin has held research positions at Trinity College, the University of Cambridge, and All Souls College at the University of Oxford, and he received the inaugural Leszek Kołakowski Honorary Fellowship from the Foundation for Polish Science in 2016.



NAOMI LAMOREAUX Moore Distinguished Scholar

Lamoreaux is the Stanley B. Resor Professor of Economics and History at Yale University, a senior research scholar at the University of Michigan Law School, and a research associate at the National Bureau of Economic Research. She has written and edited several books and published articles on business, economic, and financial history. Her current research interests include patenting and the market for technology in the late nineteenth and twentieth century U.S., as well as business organizational forms and contractual freedom in the U.S. and Europe in the nineteenth and twentieth centuries. Lamoreaux's visit as a Moore Scholar begins mid-January 2023.



MAYA LIVIO
Artist-in-Residence

Livio is a researcher, media-maker, writer, curator, and, most recently, an assistant professor of climate, environmental justice, media, and communication at American University in Washington, DC. Her justice-oriented, interdisciplinary work probes the contact zones between ecosystems and technological systems, investigating multispecies living and dying on a networked planet. Livio, who earned a PhD from the University of Colorado Boulder, will teach a course on environmental media for Caltech undergraduates as this spring's artist-in-residence.

BECKY YING LU Lecturer in Music

Lu joins HSS this year as a lecturer in music. With degrees in musicology from Cornell University (PhD '21) and the University of Oxford (MPhil '14), she has taught a variety of music classes at Ithaca College as well as at Cornell, Syracuse, Oxford, and Yale Universities. She has been invited to perform the piano at venues including Jordan Hall, the Kennedy Center, and Lincoln Center. And, as a soloist and chamber musician, she has collaborated with regional American orchestras, appeared on NPR, and participated in festivals across the United States and Europe.



FRANCESCA ROCHBERGFrancis Bacon Visiting Professor of History

Rochberg, the Catherine and William L. Magistretti Distinguished Professor of Near Eastern Studies at UC Berkeley, is a leading expert on the history of Babylonian astronomy and astrology, focusing on the second and first millennia BCE. An elected member of the American Philosophical Society, she is the latest recipient of the Francis Bacon Award in the History and Philosophy of Science and Technology from HSS. In spring 2023, she will teach a course on the models and theory in ancient astronomy and will co-organize the next iteration of the Francis Bacon conference.



ANDREW SINCLAIRVisiting Assistant Professor of Finance

Sinclair is an assistant professor of finance at the University of Hong Kong visiting HSS for two years. He studies the institutional foundations of Chinese finance and how the unique institutions affect market development and market outcomes. His work spans both historical and contemporary China, and his current project studies the Chinese government's commitment problem and its implications for finance and society. Sinclair, who holds a PhD in financial economics from Yale University, will teach a course on Chinese finance this fall and another on hedge funds in the spring.



PAI WANGLecturer in Chinese

Wang is an experienced instructor in Chinese as a foreign language; Chinese-language film, literary, and media culture; East Asian film and popular culture; performance studies; and digital media distribution. She completed her PhD in cultural studies at UC San Diego, and she holds an MA in Chinese studies from the Chinese University of Hong Kong. During her time at UC San Diego, she taught in the literature department and Chinese Studies Program.



LUIGI ZINGALESMoore Distinguished Scholar

Zingales is the Robert C. McCormack Distinguished Service Professor of Entrepreneurship and Finance and the George G. Rinder Faculty Fellow at the University of Chicago Booth School of Business. His research interests span from corporate governance to financial development, from political economy to the economic effects of culture. He co-developed the Financial Trust Index, which is designed to monitor the level of trust that Americans have toward their financial system. Zingales is scheduled to visit HSS as a Moore Scholar for the month of February 2023.

Postdoctoral Scholar Research Associate in Computational Neuroscience of Social Media

Garg holds a PhD in cognitive and information sciences from UC Merced and an MS with a

specialization in biology from the Indian Institute of Science Education and Research, Mohali. Her research interests span adaptive behavior, collective cognition, cultural evolution, and complex systems. She joined the Mobbs Lab this summer to develop ways to measure emotion through paradigms that mimic social media interaction. Using fMRI and social network analyses, she investigates how networks influence threat perception and inclusion.



RANI GERA

Postdoctoral Scholar Research Associate in Neuroscience and Psychology

Gera joined HSS this summer as a postdoctoral scholar in neuroscience and psychology

in the O'Doherty Lab. He studies the neural and psychological mechanisms of habits using a combination of online testing, phone-based testing, and neuroimaging. Combining computational modeling with behavioral analysis, he investigates the factors that give rise to the formation of habits. Earlier this year, Gera received his PhD in neuroscience from Tel Aviv University.

Another familiar face, Han earned her PhD in neurobiology earlier this year as a graduate student in the Adolphs Lab,

where she co-led the COVID-Dynamic Longitudinal Study. She is interested in the dimensional structure of human emotions, individual differences, and mental health. Her research takes an interdisciplinary approach to investigate emotions by collecting large-scale behavioral data via online crowdsourcing platforms and then applying advanced visualization and machine learning techniques.

Hausladen is interested in behavioral economics and computational social choice. She holds degrees in

economics from the University of Cologne (PhD '20) and the University of Passau (MS '17), and she recently completed a postdoctoral appointment at ETH Zurich. As a postdoctoral scholar in the Camerer Lab, she will conduct research on stereotypes and inequality. Her project will investigate how a two-dimensional warmth-competence scale could lead to a deeper understanding of the economic decisions people make and the nature of discrimination in markets.

With degrees in information science (MPS '16) and communication (MS '20, PhD '22) from Cornell University as well a BS in neuroscience from Rhodes College, Pandita joined the Mobbs Lab this summer to study the neuroscience of social media. Her research focuses on mental health, technology, and embodiment. As a postdoc, she develops ways to measure emotion and create interventions through paradigms that mimic social media interaction, using fMRI to measure neural activity during those interventions.

Toma joined the Camerer Lab in April to study supernormal stimuli, which are objects that have exaggerated but unrealistic features that draw human attention and enhance desire. His broader research interests include neurofinance, cognitive augmentation, behavioral economics, risk-taking, and artificial intelligence for neuroscience.

Research Technician-Assistant


