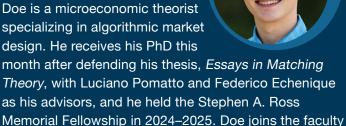




PETER DOE

Assistant Professor, Department of Psychology, UC Riverside

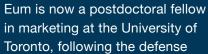
Kim is completing a postdoc in neuroscience with the Adolphs Lab, where she has used eye-

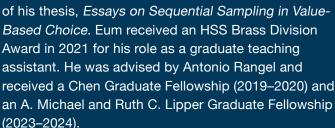

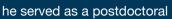

Assistant Professor of Finance, Shanghai Advanced Institute of Finance, Shanghai Jiao Tong University

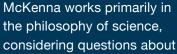


Shi graduates this month after defending his dissertation,

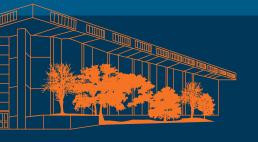

Among the seniors expected to graduate, 12 percent (32 out of 269) are completing an option (major) or minor in the humanities or social sciences. Three students chose business, economics, and management (BEM) as their first option, and one of those students also completed a second option in political science. Twenty-four students selected one of our tracks for their second option (double major): 18 in BEM, three in economics, two in philosophy, and one in political science. Five students completed a humanities minor: two in English, one in history, one in philosophy, and one in the history and philosophy of science.

Next steps for members of this impressive group of graduates include:

- Pursuing advanced degrees at Princeton University (master's in finance), Harvard University (master's in computer science), and MIT (one PhD in aero/astro engineering and one PhD in social and engineering systems at the Institute for Data, Systems, and Society);
- Beginning careers in New York as a management consultant at Bain & Company and a software engineer at Bloomberg;
